His Excellency the Viceroy feels that in addition to any local memorials that are now being arranged in India, the outstanding reign of His Majesty the late King-Emperor should be commemorated by a suitable All-India Memorial to be erected in the Capital of the country. It may not be generally known that certain Ruling Princes had some time ago, at the suggestion of His Highness the Maharaja of Kapurthala, raised a fund for the erection of a stone statue of His late Majesty King George V in New Delhi, and Their Highnesses, who subscribed to that fund, have agreed that their contributions should now be handed over to the King George V Memorial Fund which His Excellency the Viceroy now intends to open, the objects of which are on a larger scale than those contemplated by Their Highnesses.
